Ornamental Plasterwork and Scagliola



Buckingham Palace - Music Room Scagliola Columns

Hayles and Howe have been delighted to have worked in many Royal Households over the past twenty years. Last year the company were involved in the successful conservation of sixteen Scagliola columns in the beautiful Music Room of Buckingham Palace, the official residence of Queen Elizabeth II, in the borough of Westminster, London UK.

The Music Room (pictured below) is part of the reconstruction of the Palace that took place around 1825 by the Architect John Nash. The rich blue Scagliola may have been intended to simulate Lapis Lazuli by the addition of slivers of metal including tin, copper and brass to the Scagliola. The metal effected an early corrosion causing spalling which continued through the heavy shellac varnish. Over a short period the combination of the surface varnish and internal spalling created a severe darkening in colour, concealing the beauty of the white and gold veining in the Scagliola as well as the original sparkling from the polished metal. The Hayles and Howe Scagliola workshop is based in Crediton, Devon. Mark Burston the site Foreman and Master Craftsman for this prestigious job wrote the following:

'Spring 2008 saw the Crediton Scagliola team and two craftsman from Hayles and Howe in Bristol, called to Buckingham Palace to attempt a conservation project on the blue columns in the Music Room. This task was no easy feat due to the technical difficulties presented by dealing with a Scagliola incorporating shards of metal, meaning most of our established techniques could not be employed. Also as time was pressing extensive experimentation was not possible.

However with good ideas and thinking coming from all involved, we hit upon a diamond sanding and hard wax stopping method that gave us the result required.

We are very pleased that since completion of the Restoration the columns have made it onto our TV screens most notably flanking Her Majesty during her Christmas address to the Commonwealth.' continued on back page

Hospitality Hayles and Howe US Style - by Jean Van Meter

The busy artisans at Hayles and Howe, Inc. completed plaster restoration in two hotel projects in 2009: the King Edward Hotel in Jackson, Mississippi and the Jefferson Hotel in Washington, DC. Both buildings were built in 1923 to original designs by architect Jules Henri du Sibour for the Jefferson and architect William Nolan for the King Edward.

An eight-man crew of master plasterers stayed in Jackson, Mississippi and labored in the significant Beaux- Artes style heat and humidity of summer to install two tractor-trailer loads of large-scale elliptical plaster cornices and sixty ornate column covers in the hotel's ballroom and lobby. The plasterwork was fabricated in the Hayles and Howe's Baltimore workshop and delivered from north to south for this superb installation which was ably managed on site by Julian Davis.

In the US capitol of Washington, DC, another Hayles and Howe, Inc. master team repaired, replicated and installed ornamental plasterwork and restored 3-coat plaster in the Jefferson Hotel. The building was originally designed as apartments and converted in 1955 to the Jefferson Hotel. (pictured right) continued page 3



Methodist Central Hall -Westminster, London

Hayles and Howe have been looking after the fibrous plaster in Central Hall, Westminster for over 7 years, performing annual safety inspections and running repairs.

The reinforced concrete dome in this Edwardian Baroque style building is one of the largest in the world and since 1912 the building has

hosted international events including the Inaugural session of the United Nations in 1946.



Many of Hayles and Howe's staff have worked at Central Hall over the years, Martyn Watchurst and David Harrison in particular have enjoyed a long and successful working relationship with the Central Hall Management team.

At present the company is investigating the beautiful fibrous dome to ascertain how it was originally structured. To help with this

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Historic Buildings, Parks and Gardens Show

Hayles and Howe recently joined forces with Mark Van Oss & Associates at the HBPG Show at the Queen Elizabeth Conference centre in London. The combination of works successfully reflected the decorative skills of the 1750's.

Hayles and Howe provided the beautiful ornamental plaster exhibition stand for the occasion. The substantial frame, walls, flooring and ornamental plasterwork took four and a half weeks to create. It was a challenging and successful project for Derek Bond and John Fowler as the stand had to be made for easy and efficient assembly and dismantling. To help with the assembly the plasterwork was cleverly clipped to the frame which then bolted together.

The installation of the stand from unloading the van to completion, took our guys a total of 24hrs. Access to the centre was tricky due to other stalls going up, and the centre's spotlights were in the way of the frame, luckily these were on runners and could be moved.

The team got very little sleep that day but Derek, John, Matt Bourne and Lee Clark were back at the Show ready to begin the dismantling at 17:00hrs. The stand was completely dismantled and carefully packed into 2 vans by 23:00hrs. For our brilliant team it was 2 days of very long hours and hard work but the stand looked fantastic and drew the crowds.

The stand was designed by Lawrence to fit around a

Portico that emulates an original door at Syon house.

Everyone involved was pleased with the outcome and we all made some new contacts. Thanks to everyone that visited the stand. It was a great opportunity to show case the traditional, artistic and technical expertise of Hayles and Howe.

Archive item - Private Residence in the Peak district -Bents House

In 2006 Hayles and Howe carried out work to the ceiling of the kitchen of Bents House, a private residence in the Peak district. The kitchen was divided into four bays by three large, rough oak beams into which the ceiling was fitted with a small surrounding cove cornice.

The ceiling is composed of four different panels interspersed so that none sit next to each other with surrounding curved rib work which has a central foliage ornament set within it.

The chimney breast into which the AGA was fitted was rough plastered first, prior to the hand modeling of stem work with added cast fruit, leaves and ornament.

The client wished to have Bees interspersed into the design as the original owner was a 19th century industrialist and he used the Bee as a symbol of industry at its finest. It appears as a motif on the outside of the

building especially on the ornamental stone and lead work on the downpipe collection hoppers.

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

Hayles and Howe's Managing Director David Harrison originally inspected these columns in 2003 following the company's successful manufacture and installation of 28 Scagliola columns and pilasters in the Queen's Gallery, for which the company won

the 'Crabb Silver Salver in 2003. The company's technical team visited the Palace to clean back a sample part of the columns to ascertain a constructive way to restore the lovely columns to their former glory.

In The Queen's Gallery, Hayles and



Howe were appointed to manufacture and install the columns and pilasters at the upper level of the staircase hall that leads from the public entrance to the main galleries. The columns and pilasters were finished to imitate a marble known as verde giada, a dark green marble with white intrusions and traces of red. When Hayles and Howe collected their award from the FPDC in Feb-

ruary 2003 the judges remarked,

The Queen's Gallery, Buckingham Palace, London.

'We are full of admiration for the mixing and slicing of specially coloured plaster to achieve the desired effect. We also admired the entirely invisible jointing of two columns that encased a steel column and the cutting of three-quarter columns against walls by others. Hayles and Howe's work is beautiful and in every way impeccable.'
